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Are you being asked to be a Sponsor at Baptism or Confirmation?

A call to Christian Integrity

It is the ancient custom of the Church that a candidate for Baptism and for Confirmation has a sponsor (or godparent) who represents the extended faith community of the Catholic Church into which the candidate is being initiated. The role of sponsor is not merely ceremonial, nor is it simply a social role. To be someone's sponsor is to take an important religious and spiritual place in that person's life and to promise that you will help the candidate grow to maturity in the Catholic Church. Accepting the invitation to be a sponsor implies your own commitment to practice your faith and to give daily example to adult Catholic living in our modern world.

Often people ask: "What does the Church require of a sponsor?" While there are several specific requirements for serving as a sponsor, the more basic question is not: "Will the Church allow me to be a sponsor?" -- but rather: "Can I honestly allow myself to be a sponsor?" In other words, when you are invited to be a sponsor, you must first ask yourself if your own personal integrity allows you to stand at the altar to make a public profession of faith and to affirm that you practice your faith in your daily life. Are you being true to who you say you are as a believer?

It is true that the role of sponsor does not demand that you be a canonized saint. All of us need to rely upon the mercy of God for our sins and faults. Yet the role of sponsor does call for an individual who practices the sacramental life of the Church and "lives a life in harmony with the faith," that is, attends Mass regularly and if married, was married in the Catholic Church, or with the approval of the Catholic Church. If you are an actively practicing Catholic at this point in your life, you would make a great sponsor at Baptism or Confirmation!

Many of us know situations in which someone who has stopped participating in Mass and rarely receives the sacraments is asked to be a sponsor at Baptism or Confirmation. If you are in a similar situation now, I invite you to let this invitation be a real opportunity to grow in the Holy Spirit and in your own faith commitment. You could arrange to meet with a priest or deacon, or perhaps with a family member or friend who does practice the faith, to talk about the state of your faith life as an adult. Such a prayerful conversation may be the opportunity to begin a new and more faithful living out of your faith at this point in your life. Perhaps you are really not ready to make this kind of decision. If you cannot bring yourself to a renewed practice of the faith, then by all means be honest enough to politely decline the invitation to be a sponsor at this time. **This is what is meant by a call to personal integrity.**
